


SATIRE

SATIRE = The art of criticising, ridiculing and drawing attention to negative aspects of society


The 1700s are referred to as the GOLDEN AGE OF **SATIRE: during the Scientific Revolution**, science, scientists and scientific experiments were often subject to ridicule




The Company of Undertakers or A Consultation of Physicians by William Hogarth, 1736



It is an 1802 satirical cartoon by James Gillray showing a lecture on pneumatics at the Royal Institution, which chemist Humphry Davy centre right holding the bellows. The lecturer is Dr Thomas Garnett and he is holding the victim's nose

The 1st image represents a satire towards the doctors of the time, often accused of being ignorant. The title itself put in direct relation the death with the quackery of some doctors. The 2nd image satirises "gentleman scientists" and their sometimes ridiculous experiments.

The 3rd image shows Thames river water and it wants to satirise its lack of cleanliness. The 4th image shows a man watching TV but it intends to show how it influences us and fills our brain with "rubbish".

The last image shows polar bears on an ice float and satirises climate change agreements which do not really solve the problem and are acting too slowly.
